


Charter Schools / Public Schools



Rotarian Kathy Milain introduced today's speakers: Shelle Peterson of University Preparatory School and Dr. Irene Salter of Chrysalis Charter School.

Mrs. Peterson told us that charter schools are about providing opportunities for students. "In California, we have had public charter schools since 1992. These charter schools give our families choices about their children's education."

University Preparatory School (UPrep) was authorized under Shasta Union High School District (SUHSD). Every five years, UPrep is up for re-authorization as are other charter schools. This five-year cycle is part of what helps hold charter schools accountable.

Mrs. Peterson debunked some myths about Charter schools:

• There are NOT test required to enter a charter school. Charter schools are public schools, and are therefor required to follow the same non-discriminatory ("Charter Schools" Continued on page 2)

laws that other public schools must adhere to.

- There is no charge for admission at charter schools.
- Charter schools cannot dismiss or expel students for bad behavior. Like other public schools, charter schools must adhere to the same due process required for behavioral issues in its students.

- Charter schools are held to two separate accountability criteria:
 - 1. Fiscal Solvency
 - 2. Student Achievement

Mrs. Peterson further explained the contractual relationship between UPrep and SUHSD; a portion of UPREP fees go toward SUHSD for maintenance and general services. She went on to explain that charter schools have more flexibility where their fiscal reserves are concerned. While a public



school may be capped at a 3% fiscal reserve, charter schools may hold more. For example, UPrep currently holds an 8% fiscal reserve.

Dr. Irene Salter of Chrysalis Charter School reiterated the statement that charter schools are non-discriminatory. She explained some of the history of charter schools in California, beginning with the 1992 Charter Schools Act.

Chrysalis Charter School was authorized in 1996 with a goal to increase learning, to give students options and diversify learning options for families.

"Charter schools are exempt from some parts of the California Education Code", reported Dr. Salter. "For example, we are not required to use the state adopted text books." This flexibility in learning materials allows the school to focus the learning experience to their desired teaching methods, while still adhering to the state educational standards and testing requirements.

The unique teaching method at Chrysalis goes to the root of the school's education process. At Chrysalis, the school is "Teacher-Led", meaning that the teachers propose the budget, hiring of staff, evaluation and renewal of staff contracts, setting salaries, etc. The schools' Board receives the teacher recommendations and does have the final say, but overall the teachers influence in the administration of the school leads to a positive and healthy learning environment.

Another aspect of Chrysalis is its focus on nature and their desire to teach for understanding (instead of test scores).

Grant Receipt and Kids Kingdom Donation

Over all, the grants ranged from \$500 -

(3) Burney/Fall River.

Shasta Charter Academy and worked at Holiday Market. Christian thanked the club for the

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
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
