The Rotary Club of Redding celebrating Memorial Day, hosted 30 armed forces recruits at our most recent meeting. These recruits are entering the U.S. Army, U.S. Navy, U.S. Marine Corps and the U.S. Air Force. All of the Redding area High Schools were represented at this year's celebration.

This year some 57 high school student total are entering the military from the Redding and surrounding areas. Each year the Rotary Club of Redding endeavors to honor those who are offering their services to protect our country. Some are leaving for active duty right away and some later during the summer and fall.

The keynote speaker this year was Senior Master Sergeant Tommy Key, the Shasta County Veterans Service Officer. Sergeant Key works with our veterans and their families to attain the state and federal benefits they earned and so richly deserve for serving our country.

Sergeant Key had a very appropriate motivational presentation for all the recruits. He gave them some insight as to what to expect day one when arriving at boot camp. Tommy said first stay focused and prepare yourself mentally and physically. He advised to know your chain of command. The military instructors will definitely know the chain of command. He mentioned to be prepared for anything. Most drill instructors and non commissioned officers will try to get your attention in the most unusual ways. It may be ripping your bunk or turning over your foot locker. This is to be expected. They are really interested in how you respond to this kind of activity. Again stay focused.

The main recommendation by Tommy was to go overseas. First because there is extra pay for overseas duty. Next it is your chance to see the world. Take advantage of this fantastic opportunity. Tommy also said it is very important to learn your job well. You have a chance to advance through apprentice, journeyman and specialist. Something that helps most recruits is to find someone you can trust and look up to. This usually an non-commissioned officer. This person will have invaluable advice on your time in the military.

Sergeant Key said to work hard and try to make yourself invaluable. Once you have an established position, try to be the one they can't do without. This is what is meant by being invaluable. Do the jobs that help the team and show you know what teamwork is.

Most important from Tommy was to invest in your retirement. It is never to early to start to save and invest. The military has some great opportunities to invest for your future.

Finally Sergeant Key said to think about where you want to be in five, ten and even twenty years down the road. This is your plan for life. Establish where you want to be when you leave the armed forces. Once you leave what will you do with our life. What profession will you enter and eventually retire from. The education opportunities in the military are invaluable for what you will do with the rest of your life. Learn skills that will stay with you the rest of your life.

Tommy's final words were "don't forget to have fun." Being a soldier is serious business but even though you will be doing a very important job, it is important to enjoy that job and have fun in your off duty hours.

Tommy thanked all the recruits for stepping forward and joining all those who wish to protect America. The Rotary Club of Redding wishes each and every recruit the best of luck in all their future endeavors.

Every new recruit received a special certificate from the Rotary Club of Redding and that was presented by incoming president Richard Malotky. As a side to what this meeting was all about, when the Sentinel Sendoff program was initiated by Rotary International, it was first intended to honor all those stepping forward to defend our country. Firefighter to Optometry— A lady of vision By Karen Karnatz

Once a firefighter by night and a student by day, Dr. Kristi Davis put in the work to become the successful Doctor of Optometry that she is today.

Raised in Palo Cedro, Dr. Davis graduated from Enterprise High School and then attended three years at Shasta College before transferring to UC Davis for a year. She received her BA from Forest Grove Pacific University outside Portland, and then stayed an additional four years at their Optometry Program.

And when was she a firefighter? To support herself through school, she worked as a seasonal firefighter for the CA Department



of Forestry and Fire Protection in Tehama County, then as a resident volunteer firefighter/EMT/ Engineer for the Forest Grove Fire and Rescue Station, where she received room and board.



Upon graduation, she headed back home and did fill-in work with other Doctors for a year. When Dr. Jeff Kossol, who maintained a practice in Burney, was ready to retire, she took over his practice – Eye Care Associates. As it was already set up on a three-day workweek, it worked well for Dr. Davis' family and she commuted from the Redding area for 9 years, usually with her babies in tow.

As a child, her eye Doctor was our Rotary friend Dr. David Dennis and in 2012, he was ready to retire. Dr. Davis then sold her practice in Burney and headed back down to Redding where she would come full circle – a business back home and now Dr. Dennis' Optometrist. Dr. Dennis also sponsored Kristi for membership in the Redding Rotary Club.

Originally, the practice was located on Bechelli, but she knew that she wanted a little more room to create an elegant office space for her clients. A year later, she moved to the location where she is presently, 2515 Park Marina Dr. Ste. 201.

Dr. Davis' Optometry office can assist with all your eye care needs, including eyeglasses and contacts. As an Optometrist, Dr. Davis can also diagnose and treat eye disease such as glaucoma

and macular degeneration, as well as treat injuries, infections and the like.

If Dr. Davis were to give a Public Service Announcement it would be this – get your eyes checked annually! Many eye conditions do not show symptoms, so it is best to have your eye health regularly checked by a professional to avoid or lesson future issues. With the daily computer use that we have become accustomed to, it is even more important these days... The other thing that you should know is that Shasta County has 24 hour emergency eye care available. If you



experience an eye injury, call your Optometrist! The doctors rotate so that you can be seen at any time, day or night.

Outside of work, Dr. Davis is the wife of our AV friend Todd, and together they have three children; Hayden, Lauren and Keaton. Both Kristi and Todd love participating in Rotary events, especially when they can get their children involved. Community is important and they are teaching their children early to serve others.
