# Today's Program - California Humanities

**Judy Salter** introduced our speaker for the day, **Julie Fry**, President and CEO at California Humanities. Before turning the mic over to **Julie**, **Judy** introduced many of us to the idea of HAMSTER, (Humanities Arts Mathematics Science Technology Engineering Rhetoric) as an alternative to the more commonly know STEM (Science Technology Engineering Math).

**Julie** explained that California Humanities is a non-profit that promotes the humanities in California in order to help create “a state of open mind.” Through their work, they inspire Californians to learn more, dig deeper, and start conversations that matter among our dramatically diverse people. She explained that they are committed to asking and exploring questions that matter, strive for greater understanding and insight in order to find meaning, and build the bridges, partnerships, skills, and opportunities that can make California a state of open mind.



**Julie Fry, President & CEO of California Humanities**

As independent non-profit partner of the National Endowment for the Humanities, they were founded in 1975 as a granting organization and have grown and evolved over the years. They promote the humanities as relevant, meaningful ways to understand the human condition and connect us to each other in order to become a better California. They produce, fund, create, and support humanities-based projects and programs, eye-opening cultural experiences, and meaningful conversations.

**Julie** introduced us to three documentary film projects funded by the organization, *War Ink*, *Romeo is Bleeding*, and *Forever, Chinatown*. After showing clips from these films, she went on to discuss the importance of the humanities and offered the following points:

Humanities matter because:

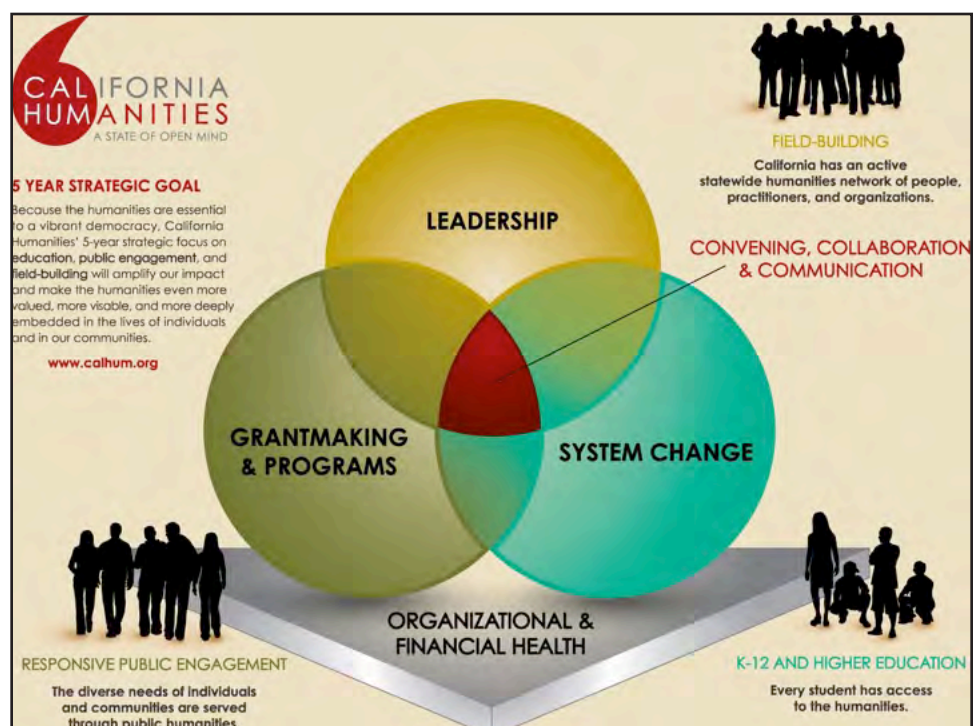
- 60% of US-born CEOs and Heads of Product Engineering have humanities degrees
- Over 2/3 of social science and humanities graduates enter the private sector, in some of the fastest-growing areas in the economy, like retail and business
- A survey of Conference Board members indicated that they look for creativity in corporate employees

Humanities offer:

- Critical thinking
- Context
- Communications

In California, the impact of the humanities include:

- Preserve local history and cultural heritage
- Boost local economies & leverage \$5 in state and local investment for every \$1 of federal money
- Support veterans
- Serve rural residents
- Work with diverse communities and partners
- Promote literacy and K-12 education



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
