Program: Jason Salter introduced Dean Germano, the Executive Director of the Shasta Community Health

Center. He gave a very informative presentation on the Affordable Care Act and the impact it has had on Shasta County.

Shasta Community Health Center has offered services in Redding since 1992. Currently they have a clinical staff of 96 healthcare professionals providing care to 60 thousand patients with over 130 thousand patient visits per year. They operate clinics in Anderson, Shasta Lake City, Happy Valley and Redding. They also have a clinic in the Dental Arts section of the downtown Shasta College campus.



**Dean** made the point that they are not a government agency, but in fact are a State licensed Non-Profit 501C(3) organization. They are governed by a local Board of Directors.

He made some general comments about health care in America before becoming more specific to Shasta County. Nationwide we pay more for healthcare than anywhere else in the world with poorer outcomes. You would think that with the money we are spending, we would have the world's best healthcare, but not so.

Shasta County and eight other northern counties are not a very healthy place to live compared to other parts of the state. A few of the areas where we are higher than the state average area premature death, child mortality, cancer rates, higher suicide rates, more children living in poverty, higher unemployment rates, higher drug induced rates, and too many others. Many of these factors could be changed by better health care availability.

Prior to the ACA, Shasta County had an estimated 27,500 residents without some form of medical insurance. Between the expansion of Medi-Cal and other mostly subsidized programs, this figure has dropped dramatically.

The two edged sword, however, is as more people became insured and eligible for care to improve their health, healthcare providers and facilities have become overcrowded and overwhelmed.

Shasta Community Health Center has recently undergone a 10-million-dollar expansion in Redding and is in the process of doing another 10-million-dollar upgrade in Anderson in order to try to meet the increased demand.

He spoke about the recent attempts to repeal the ACA and what the economic impact would be on Shasta County. It was pretty sobering. In addition to vastly increasing the number of people who would become uninsured again, Shasta County would have a loss of income in an amount exceeding 100 million dollars and a

corresponding loss of jobs exceeding 900. It is not clear what may come out of Washington. What is clear is that it will have a profound effect on the health of the citizens of Shasta County and the rest of the country. It was a very informative talk on a subject that seems to have no easy answers. Thanks **Dean**.
