This past year students who attended Camp Royal conducted a school supply drive for needy students at Juniper School. We hope to increase this opportunity to 6 students this

year.

Four Way Speech Contest: Rick Fauss will be chairing this outstanding event in the spring. We had many outstanding students from various high schools on the west side participate last year. We look forward to this year's event.

Honor To Youth: Kathy Malain chairs this worthwhile event. We honor 14 students from various schools and organizations during the Rotary year. Kathy will also be conducting Teacher of the Year applications and interviews this spring.

Interact/Roteract: Rick Fauss meets with Stellar, Shasta and UPREP Interact clubs to assist with facilitation of community service projects. Funds were allocated this year for a clothing project for needy high school students

Job Shadow: Julie Gussenhoven and Mark Rincon are in the process of organizing this wonderful event for 25 high school students to get a birds eye view of possible career opportunities they might pursue. This event will be held March 8, 2018.

In early August, five Redding Rotarians – Tiger and Suzie Michiels, Amelia Ward, Kathy Anderson, and Jeanne Jelke traveled to Chilliwack and spent three wonderful days visiting and discussing projects with the Chilliwack Club. Recently, the Chilliwack club approved \$3000.00 towards the Mesa del Nayar Classroom project for indigenous children near Tepic which which is the project our club chose to sponsor. Redding Rotary granted \$6000.00 for this project which included \$3000.00 previously sent to us by the Chilliwack Club.
