Program "Death and Dignity"

Randy Smith introduced our guest speaker for the day, Dr. Debra Newman who presented a program she titled "Death and Dignity".

She began the program by discussing the various options available to individuals facing a terminal illness, but the focus of the talk was centered on "medical aid in dying". Specifically, she talked about the California's End of Life Option Act which allows terminally ill, mentally capable adults six months or less to live (as diagnosed by a physician) to request a doctor's prescription for medication that they could decide to take in their final days or weeks to end unbearable suffering and die peacefully.

The eligible individual must make a total of three voluntary requests two oral requests at least 15 days apart and one written request - to the attending physician. The requests cannot be made by anyone other than the terminally ill person and the request cannot be made via an advance healthcare directive.

Some other particulars include: the person must be a resident of CA, be acting voluntarily, be informed about all other end-of-life options, be informed that they may choose not to take the aid-in-dying medication even after they have obtained it, be capable of self-administering and ingesting the aid-in-dying medication.

Dr. Newman encouraged everyone to have conversations with family members about these options early in life and prior to the onset of a terminal illness to allow for thoughtful consideration of this topic.
