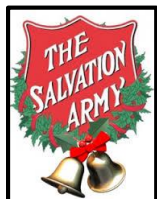

Eva Jimenez got a new Range Rover. Wow, what a nice ride. I'm envious. Thank you for the \$100 to your Paul Harris.



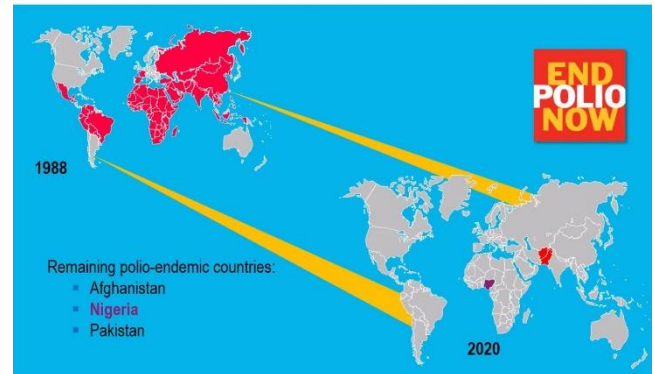

7. Support of the environment, recently added

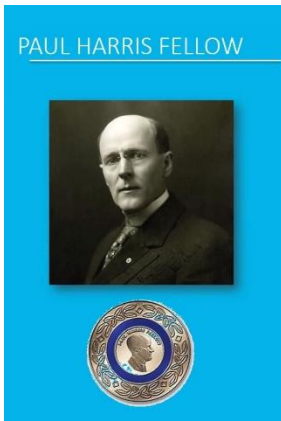
When we donate to the Foundation, your money goes to one or more of these areas.

One of the ongoing programs since before I joined Rotary in 1987 was the drive to end polio in the world. As you can see the progress from 1988 to now. Although the graphic shows Nigeria as being one of the places that still has polio, it has now been declared polio free. This is just one of many International projects that your donation to Rotary accomplishes.

Personal story by Dave Dennis: In 1982 before I joined Rotary, Pat and I went to South Africa to visit her sister who was a Dominican nun. We spent three weeks there touring with Sr. Frances and seeing how people lived. One of the places we visited was an unauthorized settlement of about 40,000 people. At the time Redding was about the same size. The temperature was 95 – 100 degrees during the day. At one time there was no water supply for the village. Water had to be brought in by truck every day and people had to meet the trucks to get water. However, since the government considered this settlement illegal and didn't want it to exist, from time to time they would not allow the water trucks to enter the village. Hard to believe, but true. The nuns had set up a clinic in the village and were providing health care for the residents. They managed to get a grant from the Rotary Foundation to drill a well to provide a secure source of water. I didn't know much about Rotary, but was very impressed with the story. I have thought of it many times as I have contributed money to my Paul Harris account. I saw firsthand how Rotary changes lives.

Ways to contribute to Rotary Foundation:

The most common way is to contribute and become a Paul Harris Fellow. Most Rotarians during their membership obtain one or more.



THE FOUNDATION'S SIGNATURE RECOGNITION

- Individuals become PHFs when they obtain 1,000 recognition points.
- This can be done a giving to:
 - The Annual Fund
 - PolioPlus
 - An eligible grant
- Reaching 1000 points through a combination of outright giving and points.
- Naming an individual a PHF by transferring points to them.

Another way EREY or Every Rotarian Every Year. This would ask for \$100 from every Rotarian in the club every year. We have 152 members and currently 45 are giving this way.

A third way is the Paul Harris Society. This is composed of Rotarians who commit to donating \$1000 each year. Currently we have one person doing this.

A fourth way is to donate to the Rotary Foundation for another individual. We have had many do this.

All of these ways to donate will help the Rotary Foundation continue to have a profound impact on people's lives around the world. Please evaluate your current commitment to your donations to the Foundation and see if you might be able to increase it.
