
Halloween Costume Contest

Anne Marie Schubert, Sacramento County DA

Anne Marie Schubert has always loved her job. She strives to protect the victims of crime and put criminals were they belong.

She mentioned with the current climate in society all citizens need to be involved locally but also state wide. This means we all need to take a part in elections and letting our representative know how we feel.

She has done this job her entire life. She takes her job very seriously. An example that took some 40 years to bring a criminal to justice is the "Golden State Killer." During the 1970's all Sacramento lived in the grips of a serial rapist. Some 50 women were raped, many in the presence of their husband. This criminal stayed sometimes four hours enjoying food after committing the assault.



After 40 years with the help of DNA the "Golden State Killer" was identified and arrested. Not only was he guilty of the assaults but he killed 13 people. The areas ranged from Sacramento, Visalia and Southern California. Anne Marie gave us a description of what it was like to prosecute the case with the victims standing before a judge. The victims were telling their stories that occurred some 40 years before and how it had affected their lives.



Committing a crime has always had consequences. Over the last 20 years the law enforcement climate has changed. Prop 47 known as The Safe Neighborhoods Act, implemented three broad changes. The consequences for theft were greatly reduced. The inclued d shoplifting, forgery, insufficient funds, petty theft, receiving stolen property and petty theft with a prior. Included in the first change is the consequences of cannabis possession was reduced to a misdemeanor.

The second change was resentencing. Those who's crimes were now classified as misdemeanors could now petition to be resentenced.

The third change was the reclassifying of the convictions. Those with prior offenses or were convicted of a sex crime requiring registration were not eligible.

Of great concern to all those involved with law enforcement is the early releasing of criminals back into society. Some of these criminals are felons and even killers. The reason has been stated that the prisons are overcrowded. Doesn't seem like a very valid reason.

California's Employment Development Department has dispersed funds all over the state to offset lost wages during the pandemic. Unfortunately this has included people incarcerated for crimes. The amount sent to criminals is something that could never be imagined.

Anne Marie mentioned over the years as accountability has declined the citizens of California have two major concerns, crime is dramatically on the rise and the homeless. People today don't feel safe in their own homes or on the street.

She said that the prosecutors that stand before a judge have been forgotten by the Legislature. This is why it is important for all of us to be involved. Let your representative know how you feel.

She said the thing that police fear the most are the unregistered guns in the hands of criminals.


Finally she said the current situation is a murderer can petition to be out of jail in 20 years. This is putting some of the most dangerous criminals back on the street only to commit their crimes again.


The question and answer period was very lively with several Rotarians relating a very disturbing experience with criminals who are on the street today.
