### Launch Pad - Helping Kids Find Their Future

Launch Pad's mission is a way for one person to directly impact a child in need, by providing sponsor funds for an activity of the child's choice. The vision is to close these opportunity gap for all children in the U.S. Under-privileged children often have the ability to reach their goals but don't have the resources to do so. Some don't even have goals. Launch Pad through providing funds gives these children hope for the future.

Launch Pad works closely with schools to identify and vet those that need help. Once the children are identified they are notified they are eligible and can enter the program. The focus on connecting children and sponsors is through extracurricular activities in the areas of cultural enrichment, arts, personal

mentoring and sports.

Once the child is chosen, the campaign can be partially or fully funded. The child is then matched with the activity that has been sponsored. Some of the vendors include Shasta Gymnastics, All Fired Up (A glass blowing studio), Redding Youth Soccer League, Kempo Karate, Dance Depot, North Valley Boxing Academy and The City of Redding Recreation Department.

Partners of Launch Pad include, Cedar Crest Brewing, C.R.Gibbs, Gaia, Fall River Draft, Moonstone, Final Draft and Woody's. The major sponsors are, Anderson Walk-in Medical Clinic and Shasta Regional Medical Center.

Part of the learning process is to teach the child to appreciate the help they have received. Usually this is taught at home by parents. These children may not have ever been taught to appreciate what they have. This happens at Launch Pad by requiring the child to write a thank you note to those who are supporting them. Some of the notes received show considerable talent and ingenuity.

This idea focused on one to one giving. The impact becomes evident very quickly. The children develop self confidence, enrich their lives, give the child a look at the world outside of Redding and pro-social behaviors. Hopefully if one can't change the environment, you can change the outlook. One of several examples given was Michael who had lost his home in the Carr Fire. Right after becoming homeless the family's car died. Through the help of Launch Pad, Michael realized he wasn't alone and was heard shouting I have a home again.

It is easy to see how passionate Ashlee and Justine are about Launch Pat by looking at their eyes. While speaking of Michael and others the tears were quite evident. Thanks to you both.




