## Sheriff Michael Johnson - Public Safety Campus Update



Sheriff Michael Johnson started his talk with why he became the Sheriff of Shasta County. His goal as Sheriff is to make our community better. Mike listed the major challenges he is facing today. They include staffing, the new correctional facility and rehab center, Illegal cannabis eradication, crisis intervention response team and putting resident deputies in Shingletown and Lakehead.

Shasta Counties current jail has space for 404 males and 80 females. It is what is known as a vertical facility. It houses prisoners pending arraignment, during trial and upon a sentence of commitment.

The major county departments working to improve public safety are, the County Administrative Office, Sheriff's Office, District Attor-

ney's Office, County Counsel, Public Defender's Office, Health & Human Services to include Public Heath and Mental Health. Other state and local partners include, State Probation, Superior Courts, SHASCOM, Redding Police Department, Anderson Police Department, City of Shasta Lake, Com-

munity College and Trade Schools, Local Non -Profit Partners and Community and Citizen Engagement Groups.

Recently Sheriff Johnson toured several correctional / detention facilities to get an idea of what the best design would be. The Santa Barbara facility costing approximately \$120 million for 400 beds is designed like the spokes of a wheel. Each spoke would house a different unit. One would be drugs. Others would be mental health, homeless and career criminals. This is just an example of how different offenses would be handled with specific needs being addressed. There would be an outpatient medical clinic as well.

There would be an advanced viewing and monitoring system which would reduce officer and inmate risks and injuries.

Our facility will be developed along these lines starting with about 50 acres of ground. Once completed anyone in need can walk into the facility for help. To qualify for this program the individual has to want to get help and go back into society.



A drawing of the Santa Barbara Sheriffs facility. This is called the North Unit. Has 376 beds, 312 beds for medium security, 32 beds for maximum security and 32 beds for medical and mental health needs.

Sheriff Johnson is well aware that many criminals know how to work the system. These individuals would be detected and remain incarcerated.

The time line for development and completion is estimated at about 8 years. The progression of development includes, State and Federal Funding, Site Exploration, Community Engagement, Competitive Bids, Design and Construction and finally the grand opening.

All of this shows how law enforcement is changing with extensive training. Each offender will be classified as to need not as just another criminal.


Sheriff Johnson said he welcomes input from the community and hopes to hear from anyone with ideas. He emphasized he want to speak directly to folks.


