Environmental Phoenix: The Klamath River Renewal Project and Free Bridge Monument

Over the last seven years, through delays and with over 500 donated hours, the Free Bridge Phoenix monument pictured here has been fashioned from the salvaged metal. It now stands in the Nur Pon (Salmon Run) Open Space to commemorate the incredible restoration of the river basin and resurging salmon run. Nice job, Randy.

Program: Next Todd Jones introduced Dave Meurer of Resource Environmental Solutions (RES) to talk about the Klamath Dam Removal Project.

Dave began by admitting he originally thought the idea of removing a dam was crazy. Our current and preceding droughts have brought the issue of water storage to the forefront of everyone's attention, but as Dave soon learned, the dams being removed do not provide water storage. They were designed and built for one purpose only: hydro-electric power production; and in

the process they have created a myriad of environmental and cultural consequences. These dams

trap nutrient rich water which is then heated by our famously warm weather creating toxic algae

blooms. The result is both a poisoning and starvation of the downstream system. Salmon numbers have fallen 98% since the construction of the dams.


RES doesn't remove the dam. That is done by **Kiewit,** a Fortune 500 company well known for gigantic construction projects, most notably and recent to us, the **Oroville Dam** reconstruction. After these dams are removed there remains a devastated area, full of mud pits and holes in the ground; sediment berms block tributaries



and streams, preventing the few salmon left from spawning. Rather than let nature run her course, **RES** is retained to rebuild the area back to its native and natural condition. Native plants and greens are brought in; waterflow is carefully studied and blockages repaired, reconnecting waterways. Areas with cultural significance to native tribes are addressed and restored.


One of the truly unique features of the agreement with **RES** is the nature of the contract. **RES** is not contracted to perform a list of tasks, but rather to restore the area to its natural state, and that restoration is guaranteed: if halfway through the project a flood wipes out all of the gains made so far, **RES** will start over from scratch and pay all associated costs with no extra charge to the client.

Thanks for the presentation, **Dave.** Fascinating and encouraging.

RES will restore thousands of acres of formerly inundated land.




