

HONOR TO YOUTH

Thursday's meeting included two Honor to Youth awards. The first was awarded by **PP Greg Balkovek** to **Davis** (last name withheld per California law). **Davis** is a highly decorated Eagle Scout with Troop 37. **Davis** joined the Scouts in 2014 and transitioned to the Boy Scouts in 2017. In 2021 Davis set out to complete his Eagle Scout project but the Covid 19 restrictions made that all but impossible and there was no end in sight. Finally, however, Tortoise Acres offered **Davis** the opportunity to earn his Eagle Scout badge by building a shelter for a 600 pound Galapagos Island Tortoise name Darwin.

PROGRAM – REDDING SCHOOL OF THE ARTS

Jerrod VanLandingham introduced **Lane Carlson**, Executive Director of the Redding School of the Arts. Long before coming to work with Redding School of the Arts in 2021-22, Lane was an RSA parent when both his children went through the Kindergarten through fifth grade Mandarin immersion program at RSA. Lane started his educational career as a teacher at University Preparatory School where he taught middle school and high school science for five years before being asked to move into an administrative role. Lane served as an assistant principal for U-Prep for 7 years before leaving there to become the principal at California Heritage YouthBuild Academy, a local YouthBuild program that targets out of school and out of work students between the ages of 16 and 24. Lane moved to Redding in the sixth grade, attended Parsons, and graduated from Enterprise High School before getting his Bachelors of Science degree from the University of Idaho. He then earned both his single subject teaching credential, and his Masters in Educational Leadership from Simpson University.



Redding School of the Arts (RSA) is one of the first charter schools in Redding and in the State of California. Last year RSA expanded by adding a high school. RSA believes that "when it comes to young minds, art enriches, expands and prepares them for a full life in useful and unexpected ways. Children who participate in music and arts programs often do better in other subjects than children who do not, and low achieving students engaged in a visual and performing arts program have better attendance, increased self-esteem, and cooperate more fully with teachers and peers."


RSA offers "Early College Highschool", which is intended to remove barriers to completing higher education. Lane shared that only about 25% of students who go on to college actually get a degree within 6 years. Quite a sobering statistic. Top five reasons are: cost; lack of preparation for academic demands; lack of discipline; unhappy with the experience and ...life happens, unforeseen events.

RSA helps with cost by college credit classes, up to 60 units, saving time and tuition later on. AP (Advanced Placement) classes give students experience with the rigor and challenges of college level classes.

RSA's motto is "Where Education Meets Art", and they are dedicated to maintain that mission by providing dozens of curricula focused on performing and visual arts. Thanks for presenting, Lane.


