

In his second year he became a Team Captain, co-chair of Keyway, a member of the scholarship committee. In his third year he was again a Team Captain, chair of Keyway and co-chair of scholarships.

PROGRAM: FOREST MANAGEMENT AND FIRE RISKS AND HAZARDS BY CARL SKINNER

CARL SKINNER is a retired Research Geographer, U.S. Forest Service, Pacific Southwest Research Station (PSW), Redding, California. He grew up on a farm in the mountains between Redding and Burney and graduated from Central Valley High in 1968. He has degrees from Shasta College, UC Berkeley, and Calif. State Univ., Chico. From 1968 to 1977 he worked in fire suppression for U.S.F.S. on the Lassen and Shasta-Trinity National Forests. He worked in fuels management and prescribed fire from 1978 to 1988, mostly on the Mt. Shasta Ranger District. Carl then transferred to PSW in Redding to do research focusing on understanding how fire, climate, and management activities interact to influence forest vegetation dynamics and fire hazard. After retiring from U.S. Forest Service in 2014, he has continued in fire research and consulting. In 2022 he received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the international Association for Fire Ecology.

Carl gave us a detailed presentation on the past and present of forest and wildfire management. He began by explaining the difference between fire risk and hazard. For a given area, fire risk is defined as the likelihood of a fire starting, and fire hazard is defined as the level of intensity that fire will burn at should it ignite.

Carl explained that a hundred years ago, it was unusual to see blue skies in California during the summer. A pervasive haze of smoke was common because there were typically dozens or hundreds of wildfires burning at any one time. This is how our ecosystem was designed to work, with regular burns consuming fuel and keeping the forests healthy. It seems that decades of persistent wildfire extinguishment has turned many parts of our forest into fuel rich, high hazard areas, resulting in the devastating and intense fires we have come to know in recent years.

Carl is one of the leading minds in the field of forest and wildfire management as we look to improve are wildfire management techniques. Thank you, **Carl**.
