

PROGRAM – UPDATE ON POLICING STRATEGY BY CHIEF BRIAN BARNER

PP Ed Rullman introduced new Redding Police Chief **Brian Barner**. The story goes that fellow Rotarian and Redding Fire Chief **Jarrod VanLandingham** was originally asked to do the introduction, but **Jarrod** felt that Chief 1 introducing Chief 2 might serve to dull the presentation, so he deferred to **Ed!**

Before anything else **Chief Barner** had an important announcement. They had solved a high-profile case recently, a crime reported by our own **President Finnegan**. Most of us have been aware of the recent theft of our precious Rotary Bell, and according to **Chief Barner**, if certain members of the Redding Fire Department could have found the time to leave their desk jobs, the case would have been solved earlier. Either way, thanks to the expertise of the Detectives Division the bell was found and restored to **President Finnegan** today. Ding!!



Brian Barner grew up in a Law Enforcement family. Both his father and uncle were police and his mother took a photo of him at three years old dressed in a police uniform. **Brian** joined RPD Explorers at the age of 15, and at the age of 20 he became the youngest person ever hired by RPD. He graduated first in his class from the Butte Academy and over the last twenty-seven years has worked patrol, canine, traffic, detective, sex crimes, SWAT, back to traffic, back to detective, lieutenant, patrol captain and now, starting two months ago, police chief.

Brian grew up in Redding. He attended St. Joseph's and Shasta High School and currently works with and around many of the same people he grew up with. He shared that many in local agencies are home grown and enjoy a special, comraderic, competitive relationship with each other.

Brian then took a few moments to discuss RPD in general and how it fits in with other departments in California. RPD is one of the only fully staffed law enforcement agencies in the state. Officers from all over California want to come work at RPD, and when asked why, all say the same: because RPD is the best police department to work for. The reason, says **Chief Barner**, is the community. It is well known throughout the California law enforcement community that the Redding community supports their law enforcement like no other. He shared anecdotes of taking new officers on training rides and their shock at being publicly thanked, or having their breakfast picked up by an anonymous stranger. He says Redding has itself to thank for a fully staffed department.

The Redding Police Department was fully staffed, well organized and properly prioritized when **Brian** took over. He has no plans to make any significant change currently, with the lone exception of focusing more on "quality of life" crimes. Specifically this means illegal camping and shoplifting.

Brian is young, bright and energetic. I think Redding is lucky to have him as Chief.
