 In February of 2018 the board approved a policy to limit Foundation Expenditures to 3%-7% of the balance above \$500K. The fund currently sits close to \$700,000, which would limit Foundation expenditures to about \$42,000 for the year. The club has the opportunity to purchase naming rights for the under-construction Redding Bike Park. President Rick and other members of the board think this very important, however the naming rights would cost \$75,000. No decision has been made but the club amended the 2018 policy limiting expenditures to \$42,000 to allow for the consideration of purchasing the naming rights.

PROGRAM – PROP 36

PP Ed Rullman introduced this week's speaker, Attorney General and fellow Rotarian **Stephanie Bridgette**, to give us a deep dive into Prop 36, on November's ballot. What is it and why should we care about it?

To understand the importance of Prop 36 we need to go back ten years to when Prop 47 was passed. "The Safer Neighborhood's and School's act", as it was called, was a reaction to what was perceived to be a big problem at the time, "mass incarceration". It made retail theft and drug possession much less punitive. In part it raised the cap on felony retail theft from \$450 to \$950 and removed consideration of repeat offenses in sentencing. A person could be arrested every day for shoplifting and if the theft did not exceed \$950, they could never be charged with a felony. Additionally, it made possession of any "hard drug" a misdemeanor regardless of the drug type or quantity.

Since the passage of Proposition 47 in 2014:

- Retail theft has exploded
- Recent PPIC report on shoplifting found:
- 29% jump in 2022
- 39% surge in 2023
- Highest level since 2000
- Homelessness has increased 51% in California
- Down 11% in rest of country
- Drug addiction has become a humanitarian crisis
- Fentanyl crisis is killing thousands

Why:

- No accountability or deterrence
 Repeat offenders treated as
- misdemeanors
- Misdemeanors are low priority
- Only ticket offenses; not booked or are immediately released

Result:

The consequences are impacting public safety, businesses, and the quality of life for all Californians.

The evidence above exposes disastrous results. Indeed, it suggests that Prop 47 is a principal driver of homelessness in California, as people who gravitate to the homeless/petty crime lifestyle have made their way across the country to California where our soft on crime policies have made life much better for them.


Prop 36 is a bi-partisan ballot measure that provides common sense, targeted reforms to Prop 47 that legislative proposals alone are unable to deliver.

- Addresses Serial Retail Theft and "Smash-and-Grabs"
- Confronts the Fentanyl Crisis in Our Communities
- Prioritizes Mental Health and Incentivizes Drug Treatment

Felony Theft: classifies repeated theft as a felony for individuals who steal less than \$950 if they have two or more prior theft convictions.

Aggregation: Allows stolen property values from multiple thefts to be aggregated so repeat offenders can be charged with a felony if the total exceeds \$950.

<u>Enhanced Penalties</u>: Authorizes judges to impose an enhanced penalty when an offender steals, damages, or destroys property by participating in organized theft with two or more offenders or by causing losses of \$50,000 or more.




Let it be known that since Prop 47 was a voter approved initiative, it cannot be changed by the legislature, but only by another voter approved initiative. It has made its way to the November ballot. 
