

### **Today's Program - Helping Adult Learners**

**Joe Wyse** introduced our speaker for today, **Buffy Tanner**, Director of Innovation and Special Projects at Shasta College.

Buffy began her presentation with an interesting statistic:

1 in 3 residents in our region have taken some college classes, but do not have an actual college degree.



This statistic was a primary motivator in Shasta College

launching two programs to help locals complete their college

education. Those two programs are ACE (Accelerated College Education) and BOLD (Bachelor's Through Online & Local Degrees). Higher education loves their acronyms :)

#### ACE

The ACE Program is designed for working individuals desiring to complete their college education through a more flexible, alternative pathway. ACE uses online and hybrid classes that allow students to complete an Associates degree in 24 months or a Certificate program in 4-9 months. Courses are structured in 8-week compressed blocks, some pathways may require 17-week classes.

The program currently offers associate degree pathways in Administration of Justice (AS-T), Business (AS-T and AS), Communication Studies (AA-T), Early Childhood Education (AS-T), Health Information Technology (AS), Office and Computer Technologies (AS), Psychology (AA-T), Sociology (AA-T), and Social Sciences (AS and AA) and certificates in Early Childhood Education, Human Services, Accounting, and Geographic Information Systems (GIS).

#### BOLD

The BOLD program allows students to stay local in Shasta, Trinity, and Tehama counties while pursuing a bachelor's degree. The BOLD team at Shasta College connects students with bachelor's degree options that are available on-line and make sure that Shasta College resources are available to help them achieve their educational goals.

The Shasta College BOLD student support program offers four 1-unit Student Development (STU) classes that one can enroll in while a university student. These classes allow students to develop a BOLD cohort and access Shasta College campus resources (tutoring centers, the library, computer labs/internet, health center and more).

Buffy also talked about two other programs.

- Credit For Prior Learning (CRL), which awards college credit for previous life and work experiences.
- Competency Based Education (CBE), forecasted to launch in Spring of 2025, will give college credit for demonstrated competency.





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
